Four members of the faculty of the School of Physical Sciences are scheduled to take part in "Through the Scientist's Eye," a Tuesday night series of free public lectures on campus during February.

The lectures are sponsored by the Campus Committee on Lectures and the Friends of UCI in an effort to provide the campus and surrounding community an opportunity to sample the breadth and scope of UCI's expertise and intellectual offerings during the academic year.

Speakers are Virginia Trimble, assistant professor of physics; Gregory Benford, associate professor of physics; F. S. Rowland, professor of chemistry, and Edward Thorp, professor of mathematics.

Virginia Trimble will open the series Feb. 4 with "Cosmology: Man's Place in the Universe." She is an expert on cosmology, a branch of astronomy dealing with the origin, structure and space-time relationships of the universe.

Other lectures are: "Thinking About the Future (Even if You Don't Want To)" by Benford, Feb. 11; "The Aerosol Spray Threat to the Ozone" by Rowland, Feb. 18, and "Higher Mathematics for Fun and Profit" by Thorp, Feb. 25. All lectures will be given at 8 p.m. in Brandywine Library, Middle Earth.
